

Additionally, most classrooms have lock-down devices installed on the interior of the door. Please take time to review the operation of this device and be prepared to activate it should the need arise.

The college also utilizes the Cougar Call Alert System. This system is designed, in part, to be utilized in the event of an emergency on any of our campuses. Please make sure you are enrolled through the Department of Public Safety to receive these messages and follow the guidance of each message as appropriate.

The college is partnered with various mental health affiliates in our local area for those in need of confidential counseling. We encourage anyone

who needs this counseling to contact us to take advantage of this free service.

Going forward, the Dept. of Public Safety will be hosting safety presentations on our campus locations, developing safety videos for our website, and issuing safety

communiques to the college community. In addition, our staff is available to present and discuss safety measures in classrooms and events.

Middle States Accreditation Commission to Visit CCC March 25-28

On March 25 to March 28, Camden County College will be put on the hot seat by the Middle States Commission of Higher Education. Through an institutional Self-Study, the visit will determine whether or not the college deserves its accreditation by Middle States.

Since the fall of 2016, Camden County College has been conducting a Self-Study. According to Dr. Jacqueline Galbiati, Vice President of Institutional Effectiveness, Advancement, & Strategic Initiatives, "The Self-Study process allows the college to review what we do, how we do it, and helps us to discover how we can improve."

CCC Conducts Self-Study to Meet Standards

According to Camden County College's website, the college conducts an institutional Self-Study by seeing to what extent it does or doesn't meet the standards of similar academic

institutions, the internal standards of Camden County College itself, and the standards set by the Middle States Commission.

The college has been making changes since 2016 to ensure that they are meeting the standards needed to maintain their accreditation; among these changes has been the addition of the Shuttle Service between the Blackwood and Camden campuses.

Accreditation Validates College Degrees

Without an accreditation, "there would be no assurance that acceptable standards of performance are being met...The Federal Government will not issue certain types of financial

When we hear Princeton, N.J., many of us can relate something to it. For some, Princeton calls to mind the old stone buildings of an ivy league school. For some math and psychology majors, Princeton may call to mind John Nash. Movie buffs may think of the movie, A Beautiful Mind.

Annis Boudinout Stockton, born July 1, 1736, was an English neoclassical style writer, who resided in Princeton. Her poem, *To the Honorable Colonel Peter Schuyler*, written when she was 16, was published in the New York Mercury newspaper and New American Magazine. Among her poems, "To

Tooth fairy Faith Golastewski, who has one child, said that she participated this year, mostly because of her son. She wanted to give back to the community and loves making kids smile.




Faith Golastewski, a parent, in her costume as the Tooth Fairy, brought her son with her to the free dental service day at CCC.



MUSIC SCENE: The Top Four and Most Influential Female Music Artists of All Time

Over the years, there have been countless female musicians who helped to pioneer and reinvent the music industry. In honor of those women and March as Women's History Month, I have made a list, in my opinion, of some of the most influential female artists of all time. Let's get started!

Madonna: From female superstar artists in the 90's like Mariah Carey, Britney Spears and Christina Aguilera, to current female superstar artists like Beyoncé, Katy Perry, and Cardi B, Madonna helped to influence countless female artists. She was the first female artist to truly embrace sexuality in her musical performances.

She crossed multiple lines without American music society, which just seems normal today. She transcended pop music and became a star during the 80's making countless hits like: "Like a Prayer", "Material Girl", "Vogue", "Express Yourself" and many more. She has been in the music industry for over 40 years and is still making music.

According to the Guinness Book of World Records, she is the best-selling female artist of all time with over 300 million records sold. The impact that she had in opening the door for other female artists to succeed can't be understated.

Patti Smith: Green Day, Misfits, Blink-182, My Chemical Romance. All of these punk rock

bands maybe never have existed if it wasn't for Patti Smith. Patti Smith's debut album *Horses* became majorly influential in punk rock when it came out in 1975 at a time when punk rock didn't even exist yet.

Some of her songs, like: "Gloria", "Redondo Beach" and "Birdland" touched the lives of many people who listened her music. While Smith is known now as more of a poet, she literally helped to create and define a genre of music that is beloved by many people today. The Rolling Stones magazine listed her album number 44 out of 500 in an article on Greatest Album of All Time. The impact and influence in music she had can be clearly seen today.

Janet Jackson: While her brother was "The King of Pop Music", she was the "queen" of pop music during her peak. Janet Jackson has had a hugely successful music career.

Throughout her over 40 years in the music industry, she's made songs like: "Rhythm Nation", "Control", "All For You", and "Unbreakable" which were all number one on the Billboard charts. She has been touring around the world for decades, selling out concerts anywhere she goes.

Janet has won multiple Grammy awards and had multiple albums reach the top of the charts. She also signed the largest record deal at the time in the 90s. In addition, she was nominated for the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame last year. Janet Jackson has made a huge impact in music and helped influence many future artists along the way.

Dolly Parton: If you have ever talked about country music, Dolly Parton has to come up at least once in your conversation. She is arguably the most influential country artists of all time. She has had a career that has spanned over 50 years! She is still touring the country in front of packed crowds.

She has made 43 studio records, seven of which have reached number one on the Billboard country music charts. She has sold millions of records over her lifetime, and has been inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame and Songwriters Hall of Fame. She has countless songs like: "Jolene", "9 to 5", "Coats of Many Colors" and Islands in the Stream". She also made the song "I Will Always Love You" which was famously covered by Whitney Houston in the movie, The Bodyguard. She influenced artists like Shania Twain, Carrie Underwood, Jennifer Nettles, and many other female country artists.

There are many more influential artists whom I can name, but these, in my opinion, are four of the most influential female music artists of all time.

I read once somewhere, that a pub, unlike popular belief, was considered more a place to gather with friends and family for dining, good talk and some entertainment. A few years ago, my son and I went to a lovely restaurant in the heart of Manhattan. We ate a "typical" Irish meal of Corned Beef and Cabbage, which was not always a traditional Irish dish. The place had a pool table, darts, many tables, music, and alcohol.

A non-drinker, I was more there for the ambience, food and conversation. Being in Southern Jersey this year, we will more than likely opt for a parade and dinner in an area restaurant.

Want to know where to get a little Irish culture or food? Here are some events and places you can go to, (to take a break from studies). If you feel like battling the weather, try **The Bard**, located on **2013 Walnut Street in Philadelphia**. Most items on their menu cost between \$12 and \$16, but they have small plates that begin at \$4.00. Their sandwiches include things like: Irish meatball sub-which contain lamb meatballs. If you have a heartier appetite, you can go for a full Irish meal or Shepherd's Pie.

If you want to remain local, or want more Americanized fare, you can try the **Tilted Kilt in Sicklerville**; but there are several other locations. One Irish dish on the menu is the popular Shepherd's Pie. If you are not quite a foodie, you can go to one of the many area parades, which are sure to delight. Here are some:

institutions require,” according to CCC’s website. “In short, accreditation gives validity to our degrees and makes us a college.”

On March 25, a team from Middle States will arrive to evaluate how well Camden County College is supporting its students. For three days the team will speak with faculty, staff, administrators, and students to ask questions about how CCC does this. Afterwards, the accreditation team will meet with administrators to discuss how the college compared to their standards.

Students Can Participate in the Accreditation Process

Students can participate in this process to ensure that their degrees are not deemed meaningless by sharing their success stories with committee members, and how they were supported through the process by CCC faculty and staff.

As serious as an accreditation visit may be, the college expects that the visit will be a positive one. According to Dr. Galbiati, “We expect that the team will listen to members of the college and ask questions about how CCC supports their faculty, staff, and students. We expect a very positive visit as they hear about what we do and how our students successfully complete their studies and advance to the workforce or transfer to four-year universities.” It will also give Camden County College an idea of how it has been performing, and the opportunity to make positive changes for the students to come.



A: I remember in high school, when JFK* died. The teacher came in the room. We could see that she had been crying, and then she told us that JFK had been killed. Everyone started crying. I also remember when I was much younger. I was looking at a squirrel in the park. I don't know why, but it just started chasing me.

CP: What is one great technological advance that you think is great?

A: In general, I'd say electricity, but for my time, computers that people could have in their house. When they were first invented, only office buildings had them and you couldn't really have one.

CP: How has school/going to college changed for girls?

General Washington", one of several she wrote about him, received a personal reply from George Washington himself. At approximately 21, she married Richard Stockton, an attorney, who went on to be a signer of the Declaration of Independence.

According to reports, she was happily married, had six children and wrote about 120 poems, patriotic pieces. During Richard and Annis' time in Princeton, they resided at a home he had been given by his family. She named it Morven and entertained many high profile people,

including George Washington, with whom she personally corresponded, at their home and garden. Although many women were not published, Annis was among the few women whose work were published and read nationally and internationally. She was also an honorary member of the American Whig Society; a group that worked toward revolution. She was the only woman given that honor for her act of hiding important papers for the society. Quite an accomplishment for a woman in her time.

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
